THE 71ST ANNUAL ACADEMIC DAY (VIRTUAL) CELEBRATIONS





EARTH DAY – 22nd April

The annual Earth Day takes place on the 22nd of April. It was celebrated on April 22, 1970, for the very first time. Although the Earth Day originated in the U.S, today, it is celebrated globally in more than 193 countries. The idea of designating a specific day for celebrating the Earth and recognising its superior importance in our lives, was given by peace activist, John McConnell for the first time in a UNESCO conference in 1969. But the true credit for bringing about the celebration of the Earth Day, is given to the U.S Senator Gaylord Nelson. Nelson was a man who kept issues like environmental protection and prevention of its continuous exploitation, close to his heart.

A major oil spill in Santa Barbara, in 1969 is what moved Senator Nelson to implore the government to make environmental protection, an important agenda, and make the people realise the urgent need to take action in the favour of nature. It was for this reason that the Earth Day was first constituted.



WORLD BOOK DAY – 23rd April

In 1995, UNESCO decided that the World Book Day would be celebrated on 23rd April, as the date coincides with the death anniversary of William Shakespeare. He is often regarded as England's national poet and the "Bard of Avon" because he wrote about life, love, death, revenge, jealousy, magic and mystery. William belonged to a quite well to do family that gave him the liberty to discover his passion for writing. After attending the local grammar school, he married Anne Hathaway, who was eight years his senior. The couple had three children, one of which died prematurely. Shakespeare's ancestors subsequently died out, leaving no direct descendants of his own. He breathed his last on April 23, 1616 and his grave bears the epitaph "Blessed be the man that spares these stones, / And cursed be he that moves my bones." Some believe that this was penned by Shakespeare himself to ward off shrewd robbers.

result, sea levels have increased due to the melting icebergs and glaciers, and so Mumbai, Kolkata, London, The Bahamas, Bangkok, New Orleans and many more places are expected to submerge in water by 2050. Millions of people are going to get exposed to extreme heat waves moreover, droughts are expected to increase. In the recent past, many bizarre weather events have also occurred, like the Australian and Californian wildfires that killed more than a billion animals. These emitted a massive amount of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Moreover, Extreme floods hit China, India and Pakistan and extreme storms hit Asia and North America along with the record-breaking hurricane season in the Atlantic. But the most absurd of all were the out of the ordinary snow storms in Texas and Saudi Arabia. Human activities not only induced eccentric weather events but have also enormously affected wildlife. A point worth noticing is that freshwater species are the most critically endangered along, with Kemp Ridley's Sea Turtles. The fact that Polar bears are on the verge of extinction is also very well known. Other animals that are on the path of extinction include Pandas, Asian and African elephants, snow leopards, cheetahs, etc. This human-induced climate change not only disrupts the ecological balance but also poses danger to the human race itself. There is an



increase in the number of cancer cases which is expected to rise more. The Black Fungus Disease

In our childhood, we were given a task by our Science teacher to take a slice of bread, sprinkle some water over it and keep it aside for a few days. We would then observe a greenish black substance growing all over it. This substance was nothing but 'Black Fungus'. This experiment had proven that fungus was everywhere and could be grown on anything that contained some sort of moisture in it. From this, the people need to understand that this is not a communicable or a new disease of some sort.

The reason as to why this disease has created such a hype in recent times is because, before the Covid-19 pandemic, this disease was observed mainly in people with diabetes or other diseases that led to compromised immunity . During the treatment of Covid, administering steroids to the patients is a general procedure. This leads to high sugar levels in both diabetic and non diabetic patients thus increasing the rate of this fungal infection . Another reason for the spread of this disease is the improper usage of masks. General people should avoid using surgical and N-95 masks. In case such masks are used, they should be disposed off immediately as they are not washable. When we breathe in a mask, it catches moisture just like the moisture on that slice of bread. To familiarize our Class V students, with the writing medium that was used in the Early Civilization, students of class V made their own clay tablets.


Children used the material easily available with them, be it soil or dough or the modelling clay.

Different movies were selected by the teachers keeping the interest of the children in mind.




Evening Hobbies



पृथ्वी को इस अपमान से बचाने के लिए 22 अप्रैल, 1970 को पहली बार पृथ्वी दिवस मनाया गया। इसका उदेश्य था लोगों को पर्यावरण के प्रति जागरूक बनाना। इस दिवस की स्थापना अमेरिकी सिनेटर गेलॉर्ड नेल्सन के द्वारा की गई थी। 1990 से इसे एक अंतराष्ट्रीय दिवस के रूप में मनाया जाने लगा। 2009 में संयुक्त राष्ट्र ने इसे 'विश्व पृथ्वी दिवस'मनाने की घोषणा कर दी।

आज प्रदूषण की समस्या से तो पूरी धरती जूझ रही है। प्रदूषण एक ऐसा राक्षस है जिसने धरती माँ को सभी ओर से घेर लिया है। यही कारण है कि कहीं बाढ़ है, कहीं सूखा पड़ रहा है, विश्व भर में कई राज्य ऐसे हो गए हैं जहाँ लोगों को पीने का पानी भी पर्याप्त नहीं मिल रहा।

धरती का तापमान, जो कि प्रदूषण के कारण बहुत बढ़ गया है, कई मुसीबतों का कारण बन गया है, जिसमें से 'ओज़ोन पर्त' का कम होना एक महत्वपूर्ण एवं गंभीर समस्या है।
